Community Members of the Rockwood Area School District,

I am hopeful this edition of the Rockwood School News finds you well as the first signs of spring begin to emerge, following a notably active winter season. This school year, winter brought more interruptions than usual, with six of the seven built in traditional snow days already used, as of the writing of this article. After the traditional snow days are exhausted, the district will operate on Flexible Instruction Days (FIDs), which were added to the calendar to ensure continuity of learning in case of further cancellations.

Community Support for District Activities

Students and staff are fortunate to receive continuous support from the community. A recent example of this generosity took place in January when students in Mr. Doug Spiri's music classroom returned from Christmas break to an exciting surprise - a Baby Grand Piano. This beautiful instrument was graciously donated by District residents Mr. and Mrs. Tom and Lorie Skelton. Mr. Spiri and his students are thrilled to incorporate the piano into their rehearsals as they prepare for their upcoming spring concert.

The District would, once again, like to thank and recognize the Rockwood Class of 1965 for their ongoing support. The class members donated \$950.00 to the District's Kids Come First Organization. Kids Come First supports students' needs throughout the year, especially during the holiday season. The Class of 1965 has a long history of giving back to its alma mater in support of student programs.

The District would also like to recognize and thank several businesses for their support of student activities. The District received PA Educational Improvement Tax Credits from Wheeler Brothers, Inc. of Somerset and BDH/Konhaus Agency of Meyersdale. The \$500.00 of EITC funding was used to support the "Engineering is Elementary" program, which offers students in grades 4-6 hands-on engineering/design and problem-solving experiences, as well as introducing them to possible careers in engineering. The \$12,500.00 of funding from Wheeler Brothers was used to offset tuition costs for students enrolled in "Dual Enrollment" college classes offered at Rockwood. In addition to the EITC funds, Somerset Trust generously provided funding to cover the cost of a Somerset County student's first college class taken in high school.

Additionally, the District would like to thank and recognize Rockwood ASSA ABLOY for donating a 3D printer to the District's Engineering and Technology classroom. The additional 3D printer will allow students to print more projects concurrently. The District is extremely grateful for the support of community organizations, businesses, and individuals.

Board Member Recognition

School board directors are elected to govern and make informed decisions on behalf of our public schools, for the benefit of our students and communities. The work is challenging and complex, and directors dedicate hours each month to board business. In honor of their time and dedication all year long, January is designated as School Director Recognition Month.

In honor of the commitment and time school board members volunteer on behalf of our schools and communities, the school district observed and celebrated School Director Recognition Month in January. The work of these public servants is vital to the success of our students and schools. From voting on budgets to adopting policy to conducting strategic planning, school boards make key decisions that drive public education. The work is both complex and diverse. School directors devote, on average, 10 hours each month to board business. Board service is unpaid, and school directors are often motivated to pursue the role out of a desire to benefit their community.

The majority of school directors indicated their primary reason for serving is to give back or contribute to public education or to improve educational outcomes for students. Please take time to thank your elected school directors for their time and effort. District Finances

The District remains in strong financial health overall. We encourage you to review the financial charts and graphs included in this newsletter, which reflect the District's audited revenue, expenditures, and fund balance.

The District ended the 2023-2024 fiscal year with a surplus that was larger than usual, driven by higher-than-expected revenue from the State, earned income tax, and interest income. Additionally, several "one-time expenditures" were deferred to the following fiscal year. As a result, the District closed the year with a fund balance exceeding \$6.7 million. This increased fund balance will enable the District to complete much-needed infrastructure projects without taking on debt or borrowing funds.



In partnership with SiteLogIQ, a leading energy efficiency and facility solutions company, the District is actively working to improve energy efficiency, maintain our facilities, and secure long-term infrastructure upgrades. SiteLogIQ has structured the upgrades into three phases.

The first phase of work is scheduled for this summer and will focus on upgrading the District's aging electrical system, where critical components and controls are nearly 70 years old. This phase is estimated to cost \$1,068,659.00 and will be carried out by Darr Construction, Inc. of Berlin. Work will begin after the last day of school and is set to be completed before the school year resumes in August. Please note that most of the District's buildings will be closed and inaccessible during July, as power will be shut off to the buildings. To accommodate this closure, summer activities, work schedules, and vacation plans are being adjusted accordingly.

The future phases of the project will involve more extensive and costly upgrades, including the installation of new propane/natural gas condensing boilers, domestic water heating systems, hot water pumps and piping, select HVAC replacements, and updated building controls.

In the coming months, the School Board will meet to develop the operating budget for the 2025-2026 school year. The Board will prioritize and decide which "one-time expenditures" to include in next year's budget, in addition to the infrastructure work planned for this summer.

Bedtime Tips for Children and Teenagers

A good night's sleep is about getting to sleep, staying asleep, and waking up feeling refreshed in the morning. Most children fall asleep within 20 minutes of going to

bed. How long it takes children to get to sleep can depend on how sleepy their bodies are. Also, daytime and bedtime routines can affect when children get to sleep. Bedtime routines help children wind down before bedtime.

- Set up a bedtime routine
- Keep regular sleep and wake times
- Check noise and light in your child's bedroom
- Make sure your child feels safe at night
- Eat the right amount at the right time
- Relax before bedtime
- Avoid caffeine
- Avoid the clock
- Get plenty of natural light in the day
- Keep older children's naps early and short

Turn off devices at least one hour before bedtime. Pausing screen-related activities at least an hour before bedtime gives your brain a chance to wind down and signals to your body that it's time to sleep. Keep digital technology out of your child's room at night. Dim the lights an hour before bed for children of preschool age and younger. If your child uses a night-light, choose a dim, warm-colored globe, rather than a bright, white, cool-colored globe.

As spring arrives, we are excited to share the latest highlights and updates from our Jr./Sr. High School! This newsletter celebrates the achievements of our students and showcases the incredible opportunities that continue to enrich our school community. It is truly inspiring to see the dedication, hard work, and success of our students and staff, and we are pleased to recognize their accomplishments.

We are proud to celebrate the achievements of our students, with 130 earning High Honor Roll status (3.5 GPA or higher) and 59 achieving Honor Roll (3.0–3.4 GPA). Congratulations to each of these hardworking students. Your dedication and commitment to excellence are truly commendable! Keep up the great work!

Our College in High School program continues to thrive, offering students invaluable opportunities to earn college credits while still in high school. Through partnerships with St. Francis University, Allegany College of Maryland, and the University of Pittsburgh, students can accumulate up to 32 college credits - providing a significant head start as they prepare for their post-secondary education.

Additionally, our Somerset County Technology Center students continue to excel, earning certifications in their respective trades. We have three students participating in co-op programs and four students engaged in school-to-work experiences, where they split their day between classroom learning and real-world industry experience.

The Class of 2025 will showcase their talents and skills through their senior projects on March 14. Students will present to panels of teachers, business professionals, and community members; sharing their research on chosen career paths. As part of the process, they will create a presentation highlighting their interests and personal experiences, including: coursework, employment, job shadowing, and community service. During the presentations, students will engage in discussions and answering and asking questions about potential future careers in fields such as: healthcare, technical trades, veterinary sciences, wildlife management, applied sciences, real estate, missionary services, sports communication, science, government, business, and education. These projects provide valuable insights and networking opportunities; helping students prepare for their next steps. We are incredibly grateful to the 75 community members who will volunteer their time to support and guide our students during this event.

We are incredibly proud of our students' dedication to community service and the positive impact they make. A new opportunity for National Honor Society members is volunteering at the Somerset County Mobile Food Bank, held at the Rockwood Community Bible Church. Each month, students play a vital role in distributing essential items to families in need, demonstrating compassion, leadership, and a strong commitment to serving others.

Junior High Fun Night made a successful return this year, providing students with a fun and engaging opportunity to build positive peer relationships while making healthy choices. A total of 122 students in grades 7-9 participated in the event at Urban Air Adventure Park in Irwin, PA. Thanks to a grant from Bedford/Somerset DBHS and the Rockwood Area School District, students enjoyed an exciting and meaningful experience. Host schools help build diplomatic bridges with other nations by leaving positive, lasting impressions of the United States on their exchange students.

By enrolling a U.S. Department of State-sponsored exchange student, high schools become Medallion Member Schools. These schools set themselves apart by demonstrating a commitment to academic and cultural enrichment for their students through international exchange. Medallion Member Schools may pair the official medallion with their school name and advertise on banners, newsletters, websites, signage, clothing designs, and more.

Create Global Citizens

The world is increasingly interconnected. By participating in the Medallion Program, you can prepare your students to become global citizens. Exchange students introduce your students to another culture and increase their international awareness without requiring them to travel. CBYX, FLEX and YES students also positively impact your school through sharing their countries and cultures, engaging in extracurricular activities, and volunteering in their communities.

Rockwood FFA: Celebrating Achievements and Embracing Opportunities

The Rockwood Future Farmers of America (FFA) chapter began with an eventful start this school year; filled with meaningful projects, student achievements, and engaging community activities. As we navigate through the academic year, it's heartwarming to reflect on the impactful initiatives that we have embarked upon, showcasing the dedication and hard work of our student members.

One of the standout projects undertaken by the Rockwood FFA this year was the construction of turtle habitats in collaboration with the Fish and Boat Commission. This initiative not only contributes to local wildlife conservation but also allows our students to learn about aquatic ecosystems and the importance of preserving our natural resources. Engaging in hands-on projects like these enhances students' understanding of agriculture,

environmental stewardship, and community service.

A significant highlight of our chapter's achievements is the recognition of four exceptional students who earned the prestigious Keystone Degree this year: Kendle Herwig, Glenn Millin, Seth Kimmel, and Gage Upton. This honor is awarded to students who complete a Supervised Agriculture Experience (SAE) project, demonstrating not only a commitment of at least 300 hours to an agriculture-related activity but also a dedication to 25 or more hours of community service.

She is currently pursuing her degree in agriculture education at Penn State; paving the way for her to inspire the next generation of agricultural leaders.

These competitive grants were distributed to 20 county FFA members by a generous, anonymous donor who believes in fostering agricultural education within our community. be released in Little Piney Creek. Additionally, we are caring for 400-500 channel catfish in the agricultural room. The catfish will ultimately be released into Somerset Lake. These projects offer our students valuable experiences in aquaculture.

In February, we celebrated FFA week with Ag Olympics, a day filled with fun and friendly competition featuring ag-related games that bring together our students and the larger high school community. This event fosters camaraderie and uplifts the spirit of the FFA.

With a host of upcoming competitions, field trips, and our annual FFA banquet in May to honor our members and their families, the Rockwood FFA remains committed to "learning by doing." These experiences not only enhance our students' knowledge but also prepare them to become leaders in the field of agriculture. As always, we look forward to building upon our successes and continuing to advocate for agriculture within our community.

The Importance of School Bus Safety

As we look towards the end of the school year, it's important to keep bus safety in our minds. With our schedules filling up and the weather getting nice, it's common for safety practices to go by the wayside when we're in a hurry. These 10 rules from the PA Department of Transportation are a reminder to all students when riding the bus:



- 1. Never run after the school bus if it has already left the bus stop.
- 2. Be aware cross with care! Wait until the school bus has stopped all traffic before stepping onto the road.
- 3. Talk quietly; do not distract your school bus driver.
- 4. When waiting for the bus, stay away from traffic. Line up at least five giant steps away from the curb or the roadway to wait for the bus.
- 5. Get to the school bus stop five minutes early so you won't have to run across the road to catch the bus.
- 6. When the school bus is moving, always stay in your seat. Never put your head, arms, or hands out the window.
- 7. Never cross the street behind the school bus.
- 8. If you leave something on the bus or drop something outside of the bus, never go back for it. The driver may not see you and begin moving the bus.
- 9. If your school bus crosses railroad tracks, be calm and quiet so that your driver can listen for a train. Always obey your school bus driver's instructions so that he or she can make safe decisions.
- 10. Never push when getting on or off of the school bus.

Rockwood Area School District - Student Lunch Policy



The district permits students to incur reasonable charges for school meals. In an effort to ensure the effective operation of the district's food service program, the district establishes the following procedures for student payment of school meals.

- When a student reaches a balance of \$2.50 in their account, the cashier will notify the student of their current positive balance.
- When a student reaches a debt of five or more meals in their lunch account, the parents will receive a courtesy letter from the School Food Service Liaison to inform the parents of their child's status. The School Food Service Liaison will attach a copy of these procedures and the District's Food Services Policy to the letter.
- When a student reaches a debt of five or more meals in their lunch account, students will only be able to purchase a school food program meal (reimbursable meal). Additional individual items (extras) and a la carte items will not be available for purchase. However, students may purchase a meal from the a la carte line if the meal qualifies as a school program meal.
- When a student reaches a negative \$25.00 balance, a formal letter will be sent home by the School Food Service Liaison. This letter will inform the parents that unless the balance is corrected, a meeting with the building principal and the School Food Service Liaison will be requested. Additionally, further action may result with the local magistrate.

If a student is not eligible for free or reduced-price school meals under federal school meal programs and the student's school meal account reaches a negative balance of more than \$50.00 in a school year, the district may provide the student with alternative meals instead of school food program meals until the unpaid balance in the student's school meal account is paid or a payment plan has been established with the district to reduce the unpaid balance.

High School Guidance Information

PSSA: PSSA spring testing dates are as follows: (note: elementary and high school testing dates may differ)

* English Language Arts: April 21 - 25 - Grades 3 through 8

* Math: April 28 - May 2 - Grades 3 through 8

* Science: April 28 - May 2 - Grades 5 and 8



Keystone Testing: The testing window for the Keystone exams is May 12 - 23. The exams are in the areas of: Biology, Literature and Algebra I. Testing is for students who are currently enrolled in those classes and for students who did not score proficient or above during previous Keystone testing.

Parent cooperation throughout the state assessments is <u>greatly</u> appreciated. It is important that <u>all</u> students who are required to take the PSSA and Keystone exams are present during testing dates. Please keep these dates in mind when scheduling appointments and vacations. Detailed information regarding state assessments will be sent home closer to the testing dates.

Seniors: Please view the Student Services webpage (under the "Departments" tab) on the Rockwood Area School District website, rockwoodschools.org, for college and scholarship information. Scholarships can also be found in the Guidance Office. Students planning to attend post-secondary education should have completed the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). If you have not done this, please complete the application as soon as possible. Please direct all transcript requests to Shanda Pletcher at sipletcher@rockwoodschools.org or by calling 814-926-4688 ext. 1127. Transcripts can take several business days to complete. Please stop in the Guidance Office regularly for scholarship opportunities or if you have any questions.

Juniors: College bound students should be looking into colleges and admissions criteria. This is also the time to be preparing if you plan to participate in the School to Work Program during your senior year. This program is for students who are on track to graduate but are requesting to report to their job during the school day. Students report to school in the morning for their credit courses, required for graduation. They are then able to sign out to report to their place of employment. Information regarding this program will be discussed in detail during an upcoming meeting with juniors. Questions can be directed to the Guidance Office.

Sophomores & Freshmen: All 9th grade students will be given the opportunity to tour the programs offered at the Somerset County Technology Center (SCTC) during the fall of their 9th grade year. In December of the same year, students who are interested in SCTC may choose two programs of interest to visit again. Interested students can then apply to SCTC for enrollment their 10th grade year. Once enrolled in SCTC, students must successfully complete their four core courses to remain in the program. This is a good time to be exploring career interests and post-graduation plans. Please be sure to stay on track with credits and continue to explore career paths of interest. Current freshmen who applied to SCTC should soon be advised about acceptance into the program. An open house at SCTC will be held in the spring for 9th grade students and parents to attend.

7th & 8th Grade: Students should check their grades on a regular basis, and reach out to their teachers if they need assistance or tutoring. Students who fail two or more core subjects will repeat the grade level the following year.

Grades 7 - 11: In the coming weeks, Mrs. Opfar, High School Guidance Counselor, will be meeting with students in each grade level to discuss schedules. All students will be completing their scheduling forms for next year. Each student will bring home a scheduling sheet that needs to be signed by a parent/guardian. Please keep in mind, students are required to earn 26 credits between their 9th - 12th grade years. It is the responsibility of each student to ensure that their yearly credit requirements (at least seven per school year) are being met. This year has been an exciting and enriching time for elementary students. In September, we conducted safety lessons for all grades, welcoming K-1st grade parents to participate. In addition to lessons on social skills, friendship skills, responsibility, conflict resolution, I-messages, and teamwork, the Botvin LifeSkills program has been introduced in 3rd-5th grade classrooms. Many lessons also highlight a Character Trait of the Month, with our current focus on empathy.

This year marks the launch of our new positive behavior incentive program, PowerUps, and students have been working diligently to earn rewards. Both students and faculty have enjoyed collaborating to promote positive behavior and achieve incentives. We are excited about all the opportunities in the elementary school.

The Importance of Eating Breakfast Every Day

We've all heard that breakfast is the most important meal of the day. Beginning each day with a healthy and nutritious breakfast is a great habit that can help children and adults on the path towards a healthy weight. Breakfast may help children pay attention, perform problem solving tasks, and improve memory. Breakfast may also improve school performance such as improved test scores and a decrease in the number of visits to the school nurse. The Rockwood Area School District participates in the Community Eligibility Provision program through the Pennsylvania Department of Education. All students of the district receive breakfast at no charge.

For many of us, breakfast has to be a fast, portable meal; however, it should include a serving of the following:

- A protein-rich food such as: low-fat milk, yogurt, cheese, or peanut butter
- A whole-grain (complex carbohydrate) such as: a whole-grain bagel or whole-grain cereals
- A fruit or vegetable rich in vitamin C such as: an orange, apple, or strawberries.

Breakfast supplies important nutrients that are typically not made up during the day.

Did you know, an apple's primary nutritional benefit is in the pectin and fiber? Apples contain as much fiber as a whole bowl of cereal. Natural chemicals called flavonoids may play a role in prevention of certain cancers and heart disease. The average American eats about 120 apples each year. Add chopped apple to yogurt, oatmeal, or cereal. Top toasted whole-grain bread with peanut butter or spread peanut butter on apple slices.

These following tips may help ease the rush of breakfast in the mornings:

- Stock your kitchen/pantry with healthy breakfast options.
- Prepare as much as you can the night before. Let kids help plan and prepare breakfast.
- Wake up 10 minutes earlier in the morning.
- Eat breakfast prepared by the school cafeterias.

Here is a breakfast recipe the whole family can make together and enjoy.




Apple Pie Oats Recipe

6 cups water
2 cups apples, cored and chopped
½ cup honey or pure maple syrup
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
½ teaspoon vanilla

4 cups rolled quick oats

Bring water to a boil in a 4-quart pot. Add each ingredient in order. For a sweeter taste, add more honey or maple syrup. Simmer for 5 minutes. Turn off heat and let sit for 5 minutes with the lid on. Serves 6. Top with a spoonful of plain yogurt, if desired. Enjoy!
