Career Expo 9 Syllabus: Mrs. Shultz-Room 125

Course Description:

This semester course is designed to provide a systematic approach to the career planning process. The course is conceptually divided into two focuses: an exploration of student interests in the working world and real-world occupational expectations. Students will identify their personality types, interests, skills, and job values, begin to define goals for their lives, match themselves to career and educational options, and set career and educational goals and plans. Participants will conduct career research and complete a career research project. Students will also learn job interview and budget basics. A student who has completed this course should be better able to manage their own career development.



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Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Recognize, analyze, an interpret occupational skills in their desired field.
- 2. Operate budget basics and develop live interview skills in public speaking.
- 3. Prepare for professional careers or higher education through an academic plan.
- 4. Complete a research project as a summative expression of career orientation.

Required Materials

The following materials are required for successful completion of this course.

- A folder
- Pencils or pens
- A charged Chromebook

Major Assignments:

A variety of activities and assignments will be completed throughout this course. Due dates will be provided as activities are assigned to students. Course content will consist of the following:

- Writing: Practice exercises, bell ringers, and various longer writing assignments focusing on informative, narrative, explanatory, and argumentative pieces.
- Literature: Reading will be done both inside and outside of class. Class discussions, activities, written responses, and tests will also be included in course content.
- **Employment:** Career oriented application focusing on how to plan for a desired career. This includes researching, creating a career portfolio, and interviewing.

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Grading:

Students will complete both formal and informal assessments throughout the duration of the course. Assessments will include but are not limited to quizzes/tests, essays, presentations, creative projects, homework, class activities, participation, and bell ringers. Grading for the course will be based on points accumulated from these assessments according to the Rockwood Area School District grading scale.

Mrs. Shultz' Classroom Rules and Expectations:
