



things are going steady for the Lady Rockets.





Courthouse and County Jail Field Trip

Soon everyone was crammed into a small security room with two guards who explained they daily duties and how their security monitors worked

Our last tour would take place in the old county jail. The building has been out of use for decades now, however, it's still incredibly well maintained by the workers there. The building is primarily used for storage and tours now, however, in its prime, it received constant use. The jail was complete with multiple sections of main jail cells and blocks, along with a "sweat box" and a solitary confinement cell. It was interesting to see all of the different carvings on the doors and walls made by inmates, as well as the old levers that the jailers would use to manually open all the doors in a hallway at once.

Science Feature

Scientists Have Finally Discovered How Pluto Got Its Heart By: Shelby Shipley

Since Pluto's heart was discovered in 2015, scientists have studied the baffling mystery of how Pluto got its giant heart-shaped design. A team of international astrophysicists has finally found the answer through a countless number of tests. The team was led by the University of Bern and members of the National Center of Competence in Research (the NCCR Planets) They began using numerical sequences to study the composition and origin of Sputnik Planitia or the western teardrop shape of Pluto's heart.

The heart, also known as the Tombaugh Regio, is covered in a high-albedo material that allows the heart to reflect more light creating its whitish color. According to Dr. Harry Ballantyne, "The bright appearance of Sputnik Planitia is due to it being predominantly filled with white nitrogen ice that moves and connects to constantly smooth out the surface."

Scientists throughout their studies determined that Pluto had a collision with another planetary body (roughly the size of Switzerland). They found that this oblique collision (slanting collision Pluto was not hit head-on) is what caused the formation of the heart. Due to Pluto's core being so cold instead of the rocks and debris melting upon impact, they froze forming the heart.
